Léon Boëllman was a French composer and organist. He is best known for his Suite Gothique, from which this piece is excerpted. While it may seem to be a prayer for the great cathedral church of Paris, it is notable that nearly every Catholic cathedral in France is also dedicated to the mother of Jesus, so it is my belief that Boëllmann intends this piece to be a simple but beautiful devotion to Mary. This piece is dedicated to all of the mothers in our Dove of Peace family.

²Like newborn infants, long for the pure, spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow into salvation—³if indeed you have tasted that the Lord is good.

⁴Come to him, a living stone, though rejected by mortals yet chosen and precious in God's sight, and ⁵like living stones, let yourselves be built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. ⁶For it stands in scripture:

"See, I am laying in Zion a stone,

a cornerstone chosen and precious;

and whoever believes in him will not be put to shame."

⁷To you then who believe, he is precious; but for those who do not believe,

"The stone that the builders rejected

has become the very head of the corner,"

8and

"A stone that makes them stumble, and a rock that makes them fall."

They stumble because they disobey the word, as they were destined to do.

But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order that you may proclaim the mighty acts of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light.

THE GOSPEL John 14:1-14

On the night that he is to be arrested, Jesus shares final words with his disciples. As the one through whom God is known, he promises to go before them and act on their behalf.

The Holy Gospel According to John.

Glory to you, O Lord.

[Jesus said:] "Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. ²The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. ³The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. ⁴When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. ⁵They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers." ⁶Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them.





Improvisation on Christ ist Erstanden

Christ ist Erstanden is one of the great Lutheran Easter chorales, and is thought by some scholars to be the oldest German liturgical hymn, as the original text was first sung around 1100, some 400 years before Luther and the Reformation. The tune is an adaptation of the Catholic Easter Sequence, Victimae Paschali Laudes, and both the tune and text are thought to have been Luther's inspiration to write Christ lag in Todesbanden, perhaps the greatest of all Lutheran Easter chorales.




PREFACE

who trespass against us;


and lead us not into temptation,

Praeludium in C Major, BuxWV 137 Dieterich Buxtehude (1637-1707)

Dieterich Buxtehude was a German organist and composer, thought to be Bach's greatest influence. His work represents the peak of the North German Praeludium, a compositional form featuring what is called the Stylus Phantasticus, a style of composition featuring virtuosic passages and sharp contrasts. This piece, one of Buxtehude's most famous Praeludia, is an excellent example of the style, beginning with a virtuosic pedal solo, moving into a stricter, fugal texture, and finally ending with a Chaconne, a dance-like form featuring variations in the manuals over a repeating pedal line.
