## Prelude on Veni Creator Spiritus Libby Larsen (b. 1950)

Our organ music on this Pentecost Sunday is based on one of the great Pentecost hymns: *Veni Creator Spiritus*, or "Come, Creator Spirit". This hymn, which is translated as "Creator Spirit, Heavenly Dove" in our hymnal and also serves as our hymn of the day, was originally written in the 9th century by Rabanus Maurus, a Frankish Benedictine monk and poet. This hymn has served as a muse for numerous composers throughout history. The text invites the Holy Spirit into our lives to spur artistic creation and spiritual understanding, and the simple Gregorian melody is ideal for musical exploration. Our service this morning will begin with Minister of Music, Art, and Liturgy Eric Holtan singing a verse of the original plainchant, followed by a setting of the tune by American contemporary composer Libby Larsen, played by Dove of Peace organist Kevin Seal.

### **GREETING AND PRAYER OF THE DAY**

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

#### FIRST READING: Acts 2:1-21

Pentecost was a Jewish harvest festival that marked the fiftieth day after Passover. Luke portrays the Holy Spirit being poured out upon the disciples before the gathered and astonished people assembled in Jerusalem for the festival. Filled with the Spirit, the disciples were able to witness to the power of Christ's resurrection.

A reading from Acts.

<sup>1</sup>When the day of Pentecost had come, [the apostles] were all together in one place. <sup>2</sup>And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. <sup>3</sup>Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. <sup>4</sup>All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

<sup>5</sup>Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. <sup>6</sup>And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. <sup>7</sup>Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? <sup>8</sup>And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? <sup>9</sup>Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, <sup>10</sup>Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, <sup>11</sup>Cretans and Arabs—in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." <sup>12</sup>All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" <sup>13</sup>But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine."

<sup>14</sup>But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. <sup>15</sup>Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. <sup>16</sup>No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel:

<sup>17</sup>'In the last days it will be, God declares,

that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh,

and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy,
and your young men shall see visions,
and your old men shall dream dreams.
<sup>18</sup>Even upon my slaves, both men and women,
in those days I will pour out my Spirit;
and they shall prophesy.
<sup>19</sup>And I will show portents in the heaven above
and signs on the earth below,
blood, and fire, and smoky mist.
<sup>20</sup>The sun shall be turned to darkness
and the moon to blood,
before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day.
<sup>21</sup>Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.' "

## SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 12:3b-13

Paul is helping the Corinthians understand the relationship between our God-given unity and Spiritcreated diversity. The Spirit creates the unity of faith and gives all Christians diverse gifts for the common benefit of all. We need one another's diverse spiritual gifts because the same Spirit has given them to each person for the common good.

A reading from First Corinthians.

<sup>3b</sup>No one can say "Jesus is Lord" except by the Holy Spirit.

<sup>4</sup>Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; <sup>5</sup>and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; <sup>6</sup>and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. <sup>7</sup>To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. <sup>8</sup>To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, <sup>9</sup>to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, <sup>10</sup>to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, <sup>11</sup>All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses.

<sup>12</sup>For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. <sup>13</sup>For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit.

## GOSPEL: John 7:37-39

Jesus describes the Holy Spirit as living water, quenching the thirst of all who come to him and filling the hearts of believers until they overflow.

<sup>37</sup>On the last day of the festival [of Booths], the great day, while Jesus was standing [in the temple], he cried out, "Let anyone who is thirsty come to me, <sup>38</sup>and let the one who believes in me drink. As the scripture has said, 'Out of the believer's heart shall flow rivers of living water.'" <sup>39</sup>Now he said this about the Spirit, which believers in him were to receive; for as yet there was no Spirit, because Jesus was not yet glorified.

Prelude, Adagio, and Chorale Variations on Veni Creator Spiritus, Theme and Variation #4, Op. 4 Maurice Duruflé (1902-1986)

Maurice Duruflé was among the many composers inspired by *Veni Creator*, dedicating one of his masterpieces to the tune, his Op. 4 Prelude, Adagio and Chorale Variations. This Sunday, we will hear the theme and the fourth variation from the third part of his composition. Duruflé sets the theme with noble simplicity and elegance, in a 5 part hymn-like accompaniment. Then, for the final variation, he interweaves the theme into a brilliant French toccata, featuring the chorale in canon between the manuals and pedals, accompanied by virtuosic triplet figures, building to a rousing conclusion.
