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PROLOGUE

Allein Gott in der Höh sei Ehr (Glory to God Alone in the Highest)
Paul Manz (1919-2009)

Today we begin the longest liturgical season of the church year, what we call "Time after Pentecost" and what the Catholic refer to as "Ordinary Time". Here at Dove, for the first time since before we began Lent, we will sing the Gloria in Excelsis. In celebration of this return to one of the oldest and most important hymns of the Christian faith, we have decided to focus our organ music this Sunday on the Lutheran chorale which was based on the Gloria: Allein Gott in der Höh sei ehr. This chorale was written in the 1500s by Nikolaus Decius, the same hymn writer who wrote "Lamb of God Most Holy", and was adapted by Martin Luther for regular use in the communion liturgy, replacing the Latin Gloria. This hymn has been set by many organ composers, most notably with 6 settings by J. S. Bach. Our organ music today features three settings by other composers, a 20thcentury American, a 20th-century Belgian, and a contemporary of Bach. This setting is by American composer and organist Paul Manz, who was perhaps the greatest Lutheran hymn player of his generation. His settings show considerable influence from Bach, and this particular setting captures the joyful nature of the text with a dance-like texture.

CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS

FIRST READING: Exodus 19:2-8a

At Sinai God assured Israel, "You shall be my treasured possession," and commissioned them to serve as mediating priests for the nations. The people commit themselves completely to God's will.

A reading from Exodus.

²[The Israelites] had journeyed from Rephidim, entered the wilderness of Sinai, and camped in the wilderness; Israel camped there in front of the mountain. ³Then Moses went up to God; the Lord called to him from the mountain, saying, "Thus you shall say to the house of Jacob, and tell the Israelites: ⁴You have seen what I did to the Egyptians, and how I bore you on eagles' wings and brought you to myself. ⁵Now therefore, if you obey my voice and keep my covenant, you shall be my treasured possession out of all the peoples. Indeed, the whole earth is mine, ⁶but you shall be for me a priestly kingdom and a holy nation. These are the words that you shall speak to the Israelites."

⁷So Moses came, summoned the elders of the people, and set before them all these words that the Lord had commanded him. ^{8a}The people all answered as one: "Everything that the Lord has spoken we will do."

SECOND READING: Romans 5:1-8

We are no longer God's enemies but have peace with God because we were brought into a right relationship with God through Christ's death.

A reading from Second Corinthians.

¹Since we are justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, ²through whom we have obtained access to this grace in which we stand; and we boast in our hope of sharing the glory of God. ³And not only that, but we also boast in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, ⁴and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, ⁵and hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us.

⁶For while we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. ⁷Indeed, rarely will anyone die for a righteous person—though perhaps for a good person someone might actually dare to die. ⁸But God proves his love for us in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us.

GOSPEL: Matthew 9:35 - 10:23

The mission of Jesus' followers is to continue the mission of Jesus himself. Here, he instructs his first disciples as to how they might proclaim the gospel through their words and deeds.

The Holy Gospel according to Matthew.

Glory to you, O Lord.

³⁵Jesus went about all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues, and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom, and curing every disease and every sickness. ³⁶When he saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. ³⁷Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; ³⁸therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest."

^{10:1}Then Jesus summoned his twelve disciples and gave them authority over unclean spirits, to cast them out, and to cure every disease and every sickness. ²These are the names of the twelve apostles: first, Simon, also known as Peter, and his brother Andrew; James son of Zebedee, and his brother John; ³Philip and Bartholomew; Thomas and Matthew the tax collector; James son of Alphaeus, and Thaddaeus; ⁴Simon the Cananaean, and Judas Iscariot, the one who betrayed him.

⁵These twelve Jesus sent out with the following instructions: "Go nowhere among the Gentiles, and enter no town of the Samaritans, ⁶but go rather to the lost sheep of the house of Israel. ⁷As you go, proclaim the good news, 'The kingdom of heaven has come near.' ⁸Cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse the lepers, cast out demons. You received without payment; give without payment. [⁹Take no gold, or silver, or copper in your belts, ¹⁰no bag for your journey, or two tunics, or sandals, or a staff; for laborers deserve their food. ¹¹Whatever town or village you enter, find out who in it is worthy, and stay there until you leave. ¹²As you enter the house, greet it. ¹³If the house is worthy, let your peace come upon it; but if it is not worthy, let your peace return to you. ¹⁴If anyone will not welcome you or listen to your words, shake off the dust from your feet as you leave that house or town. ¹⁵Truly I tell you, it will be more tolerable for the land of Sodom and Gomorrah on the day of judgment than for that town.

¹⁶"See, I am sending you out like sheep into the midst of wolves; so be wise as serpents and innocent as doves. ¹⁷Beware of them, for they will hand you over to councils and flog you in their synagogues; ¹⁸and you will be dragged before governors and kings because of me, as a testimony to them and the Gentiles. ¹⁹When they hand you over, do not worry about how you are to speak or what you are to say; for what you are to say will be given to you at that time; ²⁰for it is not you who speak, but the Spirit of your Father speaking through you. ²¹Brother will betray brother to death, and a father his child, and children will rise against parents and have them put to death; ²²and you will be hated by all because of my name. But the one who endures to the end will be saved. ²³When they persecute you in one town, flee to the next; for truly I tell you, you will not have gone through all the towns of Israel before the Son of Man comes."]

Allein Gott in der Höh sei Ehr (Glory to God Alone in the Highest)
Flor Peeters (1903-1986)

Flor Peeters was a 20th-century Belgian composer and organist who is now chiefly remembered for his organ compositions. His setting of "Allein Gott" also capitalizes on the dance-like nature of the tune and joyful affect of the text, featuring two part counterpoint interspersed with the chorale tune in 4 part harmony.

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Allein Gott in der Höh sei Ehr (Glory to God Alone in the Highest)
Georg Böhm (1661-1733)

Georg Böhm was a German composer from the High Baroque. He pioneered many chorale prelude techniques including the Chorale Partita. His setting of "Allein Gott" features a 5 part fugue, using portions of the chorale melody as his building blocks, and our Organist conveys the grand and glorious nature of the text through an Organo Plenum registration.
