PROLOGUE

Kevin Seal, pipe organ

Adagio (from Symphony no. 5, op. 42 no. 1) Charles-Marie Widor (1844-1937)

Widor's Toccata is one of the most famous pieces of organ music ever written. The Toccata is the fifth movement of a larger work, the Symphony no. 5. The French organ symphony is a genre of large scale multiple movement organ compositions, conceived to be played on Cavaillé-Coll's organs, which were "symphonic" in style, meaning that the voicing was orchestral in scope and allowed for a much wider dynamic and expressive range than organs of the past. The fourth movement of Widor's Symphony no. 5 is the gentle, meditative Adagio heard here.

FIRST READING: I Kings 3:5-12

Because Solomon did not ask for long life, riches, or the defeat of his enemies, God gave him what he asked for: wisdom to govern the people well.

A reading from First Kings.

⁵At Gibeon the Lord appeared to Solomon in a dream by night; and God said, "Ask what I should give you." ⁶And Solomon said, "You have shown great and steadfast love to your servant my father David, because he walked before you in faithfulness, in righteousness, and in uprightness of heart toward you; and you have kept for him this great and steadfast love, and have given him a son to sit on his throne today. ⁷And now, O Lord my God, you have made your servant king in place of my father David, although I am only a little child; I do not know how to go out or come in. ⁸And your servant is in the midst of the people whom you have chosen, a great people, so numerous they cannot be numbered or counted. ⁹Give your servant therefore an understanding mind to govern your people, able to discern between good and evil; for who can govern this your great people?"

¹⁰It pleased the Lord that Solomon had asked this. ¹¹God said to him, "Because you have asked this, and have not asked for yourself long life or riches, or for the life of your enemies, but have asked for yourself understanding to discern what is right, ¹²I now do according to your word. Indeed I give you a wise and discerning mind; no one like you has been before you and no one like you shall arise after you."

SECOND READING: Romans 8:26-39

These words celebrate the depth of God's actions for us. Through Christ's death for us and the activity of the Spirit praying for us, we are fused to God's love poured out in Jesus Christ. Nothing, not even death itself, is able to separate us from such incredible divine love.

A reading from Romans.

²⁶The Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words. ²⁷And God, who searches the heart, knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God.

²⁸We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose. ²⁹For those whom he foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son, in order that he might be the firstborn within a large family. ³⁰And those whom he predestined he also called; and those whom he called he also justified; and those whom he justified he also glorified.

³¹What then are we to say about these things? If God is for us, who is against us? ³²He who did not withhold his own Son, but gave him up for all of us, will he not with him also give us everything else? ³³Who will bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. ³⁴Who is to condemn? It is Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. ³⁵Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? ³⁶As it is written,

"For your sake we are being killed all day long;

we are accounted as sheep to be slaughtered."

³⁷No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. ³⁸For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, ³⁹nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

GOSPEL: Matthew 13:31-33, 44-52

Throughout Matthew's gospel, Jesus and his disciples proclaim the good news that "the kingdom of heaven is near!" Here, Jesus offers several brief parables that explore the implications of this announcement for people's lives.

The Holy Gospel according to Matthew. Glory to you, O Lord.

³¹[Jesus] put before [the crowds] another parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed that someone took and sowed in his field;³²it is the smallest of all the seeds, but when it has grown it is the greatest of shrubs and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches."

³³He told them another parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like yeast that a woman took and mixed in with three measures of flour until all of it was leavened."

⁴⁴"The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field, which someone found and hid; then in his joy he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field.

⁴⁵"Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant in search of fine pearls; ⁴⁶on finding one pearl of great value, he went and sold all that he had and bought it.


⁴⁷"Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a net that was thrown into the sea and caught fish of every kind; ⁴⁸when it was full, they drew it ashore, sat down, and put the good into baskets but threw out the bad. ⁴⁹So it will be at the end of the age. The angels will come out and separate the evil from the righteous ⁵⁰and throw them into the furnace of fire, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.

⁵¹"Have you understood all this?" They answered, "Yes." ⁵²And he said to them, "Therefore every scribe who has been trained for the kingdom of heaven is like the master of a household who brings out of his treasure what is new and what is old."

Gathered into one by the Holy Spirit, let us pray as Jesus taught us.



Largo (from Sonata no. 2 in C minor, BWV 526) Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750)

One of Bach's many contributions to organ music was his adaptation of the trio sonata. In Baroque music, a trio sonata is a multi-movement piece written for two melodic instruments (often violins) along with a basso continuo line played by a melodic bass instrument and a keyboard instrument. Bach realized that the pipe organ could perform the functions of all four instruments, and one of his crowning achievements was the composition of six sonatas that used the organ in this way. These works are among his most difficult and virtuosic because of the independence required for each of the three parts. When our organist, Kevin Seal, began working on his first Bach trio sonata as a teenager, an older organist remarked that "That is great! You'll be working on those for the rest of your life."

Trumpet Tune in C David Johnson (1922-1987)

Our organ at Dove of Peace continues down its long path to completion, as new pipes are added monthly. The most recent major addition to the instrument is the Tromba stop. The Tromba is a powerful trumpet-like reed stop, and it is both loud and bright. Our Tromba is the loudest stop on our new organ, and it is enclosed in its own division in the organ, under expression (which means that once the swell shutters are operable the organist will be able to have some control over the volume.) In this Trumpet Tune, by noted organ teacher and composer David Johnson, who finished his career at ASU, the Tromba stop is heard as the featured solo stop, before being used as a chorus reed for the final statement of the melody.
