Herbert Howells (1892-1983)

Herbert Howells was an English organist and composer. His psalm preludes are not preludes based on existing musical material, but instead meditations on individual lines of scripture from the Psalms. This particular prelude meditates on the verse from Psalm 37 that forms the basis for the beatitudes, "But the meek-spirited shall possess the earth."

Set in the framework of a court of law, this poem describes God calling Israel to the witness stand to testify to the fact that God alone is the true God.

⁸Bring forth the people who are blind, yet have eyes, who are deaf, yet have ears! ⁹Let all the nations gather together, and let the peoples assemble. Who among them declared this, and foretold to us the former things? Let them bring their witnesses to justify them, and let them hear and say, "It is true." ¹⁰You are my witnesses, says the Lord, and my servant whom I have chosen, so that you may know and believe me and understand that I am he. Before me no god was formed, nor shall there be any after me. ¹¹I, I am the Lord, and besides me there is no savior.

12I declared and saved and proclaimed, when there was no strange god among you; and you are my witnesses, says the Lord.
13I am God, and also henceforth I am He; there is no one who can deliver from my hand; I work and who can hinder it?

Knowing that death draws near, Paul, a prisoner in Rome, closes his letter to Timothy in a way that exemplifies how Christians face death: thankful for the grace to finish the race and trusting in the final blessing that awaits him in Christ.

⁵As for you, always be sober, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, carry out your ministry fully.

⁶As for me, I am already being poured out as a libation, and the time of my departure has come. ⁷I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. ⁸From now on there is reserved for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will give me on that day, and not only to me but also to all who have longed for his appearing.

⁹Do your best to come to me soon, ¹⁰for Demas, in love with this present world, has deserted me and gone to Thessalonica; Crescens has gone to Galatia, Titus to Dalmatia. ¹¹Only Luke is with me. Get Mark and bring him with you, for he is useful in my ministry.

GOSPEL: Luke 1:1-4; 24:44-53

These introductory and concluding verses of Luke's gospel provide us with the reason he is writing: so that we might know the truth about Jesus Christ who, in his suffering, death, and resurrection, fulfilled the ancient promises of God.

The Holy Gospel according to Matthew.

Glory to you, O Lord.

[Luke writes:] ¹Since many have undertaken to set down an orderly account of the events that have been fulfilled among us, ²just as they were handed on to us by those who from the beginning were eyewitnesses and servants of the word, ³I too decided, after investigating everything carefully from the very first, to write an orderly account for you, most excellent Theophilus, ⁴so that you may know the truth concerning the things about which you have been instructed.

^{24:44}[Before he ascended, Jesus said to the disciples and their companions:] "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you—that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled."⁴⁵Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, ⁴⁶and he said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, ⁴⁷and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. ⁴⁸You are witnesses of these things. ⁴⁹And see, I am sending upon you what my Father promised; so stay here in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high."

⁵⁰Then he led them out as far as Bethany, and, lifting up his hands, he blessed them. ⁵¹While he was blessing them, he withdrew from them and was carried up into heaven. ⁵²And they worshiped him, and returned to Jerusalem with great joy; ⁵³and they were continually in the temple blessing God.





THE LITANY FOR HEALING

After each petition: "Lord in your mercy," the assembly responds "Hear our prayer."



Let us pray for those in need of healing, for those who engage in the ministry of healing, and for the healing of the whole world.

Most merciful Creator, we pray for all of those who are suffering from illness, and in particular those who have been infected with the coronavirus. We pray that their bodies will defeat the virus swiftly, and that they will not be afflicted with lingering health problems. We pray especially for our brother Bob Oropeza, who is recovering at home after a months-long hospitalization. For the sake of your Son, grant Bob strength and wellness and long life with those he loves. Let us pray to the Lord: Lord, have mercy.

We pray for all of those who have chronic conditions and illnesses such as diabetes. Give to them patience and a spirit of endurance. We pray with particular concern for those who suffer from chronic pain. Grant them relief and rest. We pray also for those who seek diagnosis for conditions that have yet to be identified and named. Let us pray to the Lord: Lord, have mercy.

We pray for all of those who practice medicine and engage in the ministry of healing: nurses, therapists, doctors, technicians, pharmacists, hospital orderlies and custodians, dentists, optometrists, midwives, researchers, chiropractors, school nurses, and all others. Help them and those they care for to know and cherish the holiness of their work. For those whose duties expose them to deadly disease and other risks, we pray that your angels will protect them from harm. Let us pray to the Lord: Lord, have mercy.

We pray for those with mental illness, dementia, and other afflictions of the mind and spirit. We pray for those with addictions. Open our eyes to see the pain in our midst, and use us as agents of kindness and understanding, for the healing of those whose suffering may not be easily identified or understood. Let us pray to the Lord: Lord, have mercy.

We pray for the institutions of our health care system—the hospitals, the insurance corporations, and government agencies such as the Veterans Administration and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Guide them into effective stewardship of their vast resources, and to value human life and human healing more than political power or shareholder earnings. Let us pray to the Lord: Lord, have mercy.

We pray for the healing of our society, which is fragmented and is not able to come together to solve our significant social and environmental issues. We pray for the healing and wholeness of our planet. We pray for the grace which heals our sin and turns our hearts to you and to our neighbors. Let us pray to the Lord: Lord, have mercy.

Finally, Lord, we pray in the words of your Son, the Healer:

Our Father, who art in heaven,
hallowed be thy name,
thy kingdom come,
thy will be done,
on earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread;

and lead us not into temptation,
but deliver us from evil.
For thine is the kingdom,
