PROLOGUE

Prologue: K, and A, from Annum per Annum Arvo Pärt (b. 1935)

This Sunday, our organ music features a piece by the contemporary composer Arvo Pärt. Pärt is one of the most significant and widely performed living composers. His music is in a highly unique minimalist style, using a technique he pioneered called Tintinnabulation, a word which comes from the Latin for "bell." Pärt uses triads (chords with three notes) as his building blocks for both melody and accompaniment. Annum per Annum was commissioned for the 900th anniversary of the Cathedral in Speyer, Germany. The piece consists of five sections that form a set of variations on a sequentially changing melody. Pärt has titled each section by a letter corresponding to a section of the mass ordinary, in celebration of the daily ritual that has been celebrated at the Cathedral for over 900 years. K and A correspond to the Kyrie (Lord, have mercy) and the Agnus Dei (Lamb of God) from the liturgy, which we also celebrate as ELCA Lutherans.

FIRST READING: | Kings | 7:8-16


A reading from First Kings.



Jesus tells a parable about his second coming, indicating that it is not sufficient merely to maintain things as they are. Those who await his return should make good use of the gifts that God has provided them.

[lesus said to the disciples:] ¹⁴"For it is as if a man, going on a journey, summoned his slaves and entrusted his property to them; ¹⁵to one he gave five talents, to another two, to another one, to each according to his ability. 
After wind, after rain, When the dark is done, As I wake from a dream In the gold of day, Through the air there's a calling From far away, There's a voice I can hear That will lead me home.

G, C, and S, from Annum per Annum Arvo Pärt

The central movements from Annum per Annum are symbolic of the Gloria (G), Credo (C), and Sanctus (S) from the mass ordinary. Arvo Pärt's music is heavily influenced by his Orthodox Christian spirituality, and his settings of these three variations show this, building up to the high point of the mass, the consecration of the body and blood.
