PROLOGUE

Es ist ein Ros entsprungen (Lo, How a Rose) Johannes Brahms (1833-1897)

Brahms wrote a small body of organ music, but his Op. 122 chorale preludes, his final compositions, have enjoyed enduring popularity among organists since their publication. This tune first appeared in a Lutheran hymnal in 1599, and was harmonized by Michael Praetorius a decade later. Brahms' setting is lush, simple, and beautiful.

In Dulci Jubilo (In Sweet Rejoicing), BVVV 608 Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750)

In Dulci Jubilo is a traditional Christmas carol with origins in the middle ages, now known most commonly as "Good Christian Friends Rejoice". Many composers have set the tune or woven it into larger compositions. Tonight, our organ music includes two different settings by J. S. Bach. This setting is from his Orgelbüchlein, a collection of chorale preludes Bach wrote in the middle of his career as a way to teach other organists the various ways to set a chorale tune. The tune is in canon between the hands and feet, accompanied by gentle triplets and repeated notes.





⁵For all the boots of the tramping warriors and all the garments rolled in blood shall be burned as fuel for the fire.



GOSPEL Luke 2:1-20

The holy gospel according to Luke. Glory to you, O Lord.

¹In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. ²This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. ³All went to their own towns to be registered. ⁴Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. ⁵He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and

who was expecting a child. ⁶While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. ⁷And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

⁸In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. ⁹Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. ¹⁰But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for see — I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: ¹¹to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. ¹²This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger." ¹³And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying,

¹⁴"Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors!"

¹⁵When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us." ¹⁶So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. ¹⁷When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child; ¹⁸and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them. ¹⁹But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. ²⁰The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.

CREED

This ebullient setting of the 18th century French carol heralds the birth of the heavenly child. The tune and English translation of the carol have appeared in numerous American hymnals and holiday song books. Sherman's setting incorporates some special techniques for bells, including thumb damping and table striking, to accentuate the jubilant nature of the music.




Let us proclaim the mystery of faith:

John Rutter is one of the most prolific composers of Christmas music, and his carol settings and original works for the season have become an indelible and indispensable aspect of Christmas concerts and services. In this gem, Rutter sets Christina Rossetti's Christmas poem from 1885, which hails God's coming into the world at Christmas as Love Incarnate.

Love came down at Christmas, Love all lovely, Love Divine, Love was born at Christmas, Star and Angels gave the sign.

In Dulci Jubilo (In Sweet Rejoicing) BVVV 729, J. S. Bach

This setting of In Dulci Jubilo was written early in Bach's career, and it has become well known as a traditional Christmas postlude. It has been played as the first organ voluntary at the end of the Lessons and Carols service at King's College in Cambridge, England every year since 1938. The chorale is featured in groups of declamatory chords, connected by a series of virtuosic passages.

Toccata (from Symphony no. 5, Op. 42, no. 1) Charles-Marie Widor (1844-1937)

Charles-Marie Widor was a French organist, composer, and teacher. He is best known for his organ symphonies, which are large scale, multi-movement works that use the instrument in ways that imitate orchestral tone color, timbre, and symphonic process. The Toccata from the 5th symphony is the archetype for the French organ toccata, and one of the most famous pieces ever written for the instrument.
