The First Sunday in Lent

WELCOME AND INTRODUCTION TO THE DAY

On Ash Wednesday the church began its journey toward baptismal immersion in the death and resurrection of Christ. This year, the Sundays in Lent lead us to focus on five covenants God makes in the Hebrew Scriptures and to use them as lenses through which to view baptism. First Peter connects the way God saved Noah's family in the flood with the way God saves us through the water of baptism. The baptismal covenant is made with us individually, but the new life we are given in baptism is for the sake of the whole world.

PROLOGUE

Ich ruf zu dir, Herr Jesu Christ (I call to you, Lord Jesus Christ), BWV 639 Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750)

Our organ music today is centered around two chorale preludes by J. S. Bach. The first is taken from his Orgelbüchlein, a didactic collection based on the church year and intended to show the various ways that an organist could create a chorale-based composition. Ich ruf zu dir is one of the most well known works from this collection, and while it is not in the "Lent" section of the Orgelbüchlein, the text is one of supplication and yearning. Some musical scholars have described the piece as a "supplication in a time of despair," making it a particularly appropriate text for Lent during this time of grieving and uncertainty.


CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS

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GREETING AND PRAYER OF THE DAY

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all. **And also with you.**

Let us pray.

Holy God, heavenly Father, in the waters of the flood you saved the chosen, and in the wilderness of temptation you protected your Son from sin. Renew us in the gift of baptism. May your holy angels be with us, that the wicked foe may have no power over us, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

FIRST READING: Genesis 9:8-17

Today's reading is the conclusion to the flood story. Because of human sin, God destroys the earth by flood, saving only Noah, his family, and the animals on the ark. Yet divine destruction gives way to divine commitment. As in the first creation, God blesses humanity and establishes a covenant with all creatures.

A reading from Genesis.

⁸God said to Noah and to his sons with him, ⁹"As for me, I am establishing my covenant with you and your descendants after you, ¹⁰and with every living creature that is with you, the birds, the domestic animals, and every animal of the earth with you, as many as came out of the ark. ¹¹I establish my covenant with you, that never again shall all flesh be cut off by the waters of a flood, and never again shall there be a flood to destroy the earth." ¹²God said, "This is the sign of the covenant that I make between me and you and every living creature that is with you, for all future generations: ¹³I have set my bow in the clouds, and it shall be a sign of the covenant between me and the earth. ¹⁴When I bring clouds over the earth and the bow is seen in the clouds, ¹⁵I will remember my covenant that is between me and you and every living creature of all flesh; and the waters shall never again become a flood to destroy all flesh. ¹⁶When the bow is in the clouds, I will see it and remember the everlasting covenant between God and every living creature of all flesh that is on the earth." ¹⁷God said to Noah, "This is the sign of the covenant that I have established between me and all flesh that is on the earth."

SECOND READING: | Peter 3:18-22


As God acted through Christ's suffering and death to bring us to God, so God acts through baptism to save us from a sinful existence. This spiritual cleansing marks our new life in Christ.

A reading from First Peter.

¹⁸Christ also suffered for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, in order to bring you to God. He was put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit, ¹⁹in which also he went and made a proclamation to the spirits in prison, ²⁰who in former times did not obey, when God waited patiently in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight persons, were saved through water. ²¹And baptism, which this prefigured, now

saves you—not as a removal of dirt from the body, but as an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, ²²who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers made subject to him.

The Word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.**



GOSPEL: Mark 9:1-15

The Spirit that comes upon Jesus at his baptism sustains him when he is tested by Satan so that he might proclaim the good news of God's reign.

The Holy Gospel according to Mark. Glory to you, O Lord.


⁹In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. ¹⁰And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. ¹¹And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."

¹²And the Spirit immediately drove him out into the wilderness. ¹³He was in the wilderness forty days, tempted by Satan; and he was with the wild beasts; and the angels waited on him.

¹⁴Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, ¹⁵and saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news."

Living Bread Gilbert Martin (b.1941)

In Matthew's account of the temptation of Jesus, Satan, knowing that Jesus was hungry, suggested to Jesus that he turn stones into bread, so that he may eat. Jesus's reply was that, "Man shall not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God." Today's anthem amplifies Jesus's sentiment that God's Living Word feeds hungry souls.


> Living Bread, our souls do hunger, Satisfy us by thy grace; From us who deserve thine anger, Hide thou not thy holy face.

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Ein Feste Burg (A Mighty Fortress), BVVV 720 J. S. Bach

Perhaps no other chorale is more strongly associated with Lutheranism than our Hymn of the Day today, Luther's own setting of Psalm 46, Ein Feste Burg. The text and tune were written in the mid 1520s, and compositions based on the tune have been written by many composers throughout history, including Bach, Mendelssohn, Wagner, Reger, and Vaughan Williams. This setting is from Bach's early years, and displays both the ingenuity and compositional experimentation that marked his early period.
