As we mark one year since the Covid pandemic imposed limits on our society and on our congregation, we have chosen to use the readings and prayers for the fifth Sunday in Lent (out of sequence).

God promises Jeremiah that a "new covenant" will be made in the future: a covenant that will allow all the people to know God by heart. The church sees this promise fulfilled in Christ, who draws all people to himself when he is lifted up on the cross. Our baptismal covenant draws us to God's heart through Christ and draws God's love and truth into our hearts. We join together in worship, sharing in word, song, and meal, and leave strengthened to share God's love with all the world.

Let us confess our sin in the presence of God and of one another. Silence is kept for reflection.


To you, O God,

FIRST READING: Jeremiah 31:31-34

³¹The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. ³²It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt—a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the Lord. ³³But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the Lord: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. ³⁴No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, "Know the Lord," for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the Lord; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

Using priestly imagery and references to the Old Testament, the author explains how Christ lived in trusting obedience to God, and so God has made Christ the source of our eternal salvation.

⁵Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him,

"You are my Son,

today I have begotten you";

6as he says also in another place,

"You are a priest forever,

according to the order of Melchizedek."

⁷In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. ⁸Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; ⁹and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, ¹⁰having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

GOSPEL: John 12:20-33

Jesus entered Jerusalem for the last time to celebrate the Passover festival. Here Jesus' words about seeds planted in the ground turn the disaster of his death into the promise of a harvest in which everyone will be gathered.



Christ Be Our Seed Carl Schalk (1929-2021)

Last week, the Chancel Choir presented an anthem by Schalk in Renaissance motet style. This week the Choir continues its celebration of Schalk's life with a contrasting piece in more lyrical style, that features the composer's indelible hymn-tune approach to melody. The piece utilizes a text by one of Schalk's favorite hymn writers and collaborators Herbert Brokering, that asks Christ to be our seed for which Gods sends the light to wake the birth of seeding.

God prints the name of Christ upon the spirit.



Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart (1756-1791)

One commonality through much of Mozart's music, including his piano sonatas, are his expressions of joyful exuberance. The opening movement from the Köchel 284 D Major piano sonata is no different, featuring an orchestral opening, ebullient tremolos, and all of the playfulness that characterizes his early piano compositions. Mozart wrote this sonata in 1775, when the composer was 19 years old. It is labelled "Dürnitz," as it was commissioned by and written for the Baron von Dürnitz, an amateur bassoonist and keyboardist who apparently failed to pay Mozart for the work. Mozart's 6th piano sonata, this work marks a departure in style from the previous five, as Mozart is developing a mature approach to form and thematic exploration that is a hallmark of his later piano sonatas. This piece is both an ideal expression of joy, as well as an excellent way to show off our new Steinway "B," an instrument that will be heard in the Dove of Peace sanctuary for many years to come.
