WELCOME AND INTRODUCTION TO THE DAY

The gospel for the third Sunday of Easter is always one in which the risen Christ shares food with the disciples, meals that are the Easter template for the meal we share each Sunday. In today's gospel, Jesus both shares the disciples' food and shows them the meaning of his suffering, death, and resurrection through the scriptures, the two main elements of our Sunday worship.

PROLOGUE

Schmücke dich, o liebe Seele (Soul, Adorn Yourself), Op. 122 no. 5 Johannes Brahms (1833-1897)

Schmücke dich is a German communion hymn, with a text by Johann Franck and a melody by Johann Crüger. It appears in our hymnal as #488, "Soul, Adorn Yourself with Gladness". The melody is joyful and dancelike, celebrating the communal feast of the Lord's Supper. Brahms' setting is gentle and meditative, featuring the melody unadorned with flowing 16th notes underneath.



GREETING AND **P**RAYER OF THE **D**AY

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all. **And also with you.**

FIRST READING: Acts 3:12-19

After healing a man unable to walk, Peter preaches to the people, describing how God's promises to Israel have been fulfilled in Jesus. Through the proclamation of Christ's death and resurrection, God is offering them forgiveness and restoration in Jesus' name.

A reading from Acts.

¹²[Peter] addressed the people, "You Israelites, why do you wonder at this, or why do you stare at us, as though by our own power or piety we had made him walk?¹³The God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, the God of our ancestors has glorified his servant Jesus, whom you handed over and rejected in the presence of Pilate, though he had decided to release him. ¹⁴But you rejected the Holy and Righteous One and asked to have a murderer given to you, ¹⁵and you killed the Author of life, whom God raised from the dead. To this we are witnesses. ¹⁶And by faith in his name, his name itself has made this man strong, whom you see and know; and the faith that is through Jesus has given him this perfect health in the presence of all of you.

¹⁷"And now, friends, I know that you acted in ignorance, as did also your rulers. ¹⁸In this way God fulfilled what he had foretold through all the prophets, that his Messiah would suffer. ¹⁹Repent therefore, and turn to God so that your sins may be wiped out."

SECOND READING: | John 3:1-7

God has loved us in order to make us children of God. Though we do not yet know the full details of our future existence, we trust that God will reveal it just as God revealed Jesus to take away our sins.

A reading from First John.

¹See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God; and that is what we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. ²Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when he is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is. ³And all who have this hope in him purify themselves, just as he is pure.

⁴Everyone who commits sin is guilty of lawlessness; sin is lawlessness. ⁵You know that he was revealed to take away sins, and in him there is no sin. ⁶No one who abides in him sins; no one who sins has either seen him or known him. ⁷Little children, let no one deceive you. Everyone who does what is right is righteous, just as he is righteous.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

GOSPEL: Luke 24:36b-48

In this account of an appearance after his resurrection, Jesus opens the minds of the disciples to understand him as Messiah. Jesus convinces them that he has been raised and sends them on a mission to proclaim the message of repentance and forgiveness.

The Holy Gospel According to Luke. Glory to you, O Lord.

^{36b}Jesus himself stood among [the disciples] and said to them, "Peace be with you." ³⁷They were startled and terrified, and thought that they were seeing a ghost. ³⁸He said to them, "Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? ³⁹Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have." ⁴⁰And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. ⁴¹While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, "Have you anything here to eat?" ⁴²They gave him a piece of broiled fish, ⁴³and he took it and ate in their presence.

⁴⁴Then he said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you—that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled." ⁴⁵Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, ⁴⁶and he said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, ⁴⁷and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. ⁴⁸You are witnesses of these things."

Spirit of Life Jane Marshall (1924-2019)

An accomplished pianist and organist, Jane Marshall began composing as a teenager and was especially known in the Methodist tradition as a prolific composer and hymn writer. Several of her hymns are in the Methodist hymnal. Her setting of Marlatt's text in today's anthem is imbued with soaring hope for the invocation of the Holy Spirit to "give us the faith in this new dawn" and through our life's journey, including in the twilight of our lives.

Spirit of Life, in this new dawn, Give us the faith that follows on, Letting Thine all-pervading pow'r Fulfill the dream of this high hour.

Spirit Creative, give us light, Lifting raveled mists of night; Touch Thou our dust with spirit-hand And make us souls that understand. Spirit Consoling, let us find Thy hand when sorrows leave us blind; In the gray valley let us hear Thy silent voice: "Lo, I am near."

Spirit Redeeming, give us grace When crucified to seek Thy face; To read forgiveness in Thine eyes Today with Thee in Paradise.

Spirit of Love, at evening time, When weary feet refuse to climb, Give us Thy vision, eyes that see Beyond the dark, that see the dawn and Thee. *Earl Marlatt (1892-1976)*

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Pièce Pour Grand Orgue Joseph Jongen (1873-1953)

Joseph Jongen was a Belgian composer whose work shares much in common with early 20th-century French composers. His *Pièce Pour Grand Orgue* is a festive, grand postlude in three parts. The piece shows influence from English marches, and the middle section features somewhat Germanic counterpoint, but the prevailing stylistic influence comes from organ works by French composers such as Eugene Gigout and Louis Vierne. Jongen also hearkens back to French Classical organ music, using a title (Grand Orgue) that is reserved for the grandest, most joyful pieces from that time period.
