WELCOME

Pastor Stephen Springer

"Hallelujah!" exclaims our psalm. The first reading describes "the Messianic Age" when God will deliver the Iraelites from their enemies and from captivity. Isaiah uses poetic imagery of "streams in the desert" and people with disabilities becoming super-enabled. One of these images of disabilities involves the deaf and the blind. Then, in our gospel reading, Jesus heals a deaf man. The crowds declare, "He has done everything well." This implies that they see the words of Isaiah becoming real in their own place and time. The promises of the Messianic Age have begun.

PROLOGUE

Psalm Prelude Op. 32 no. I Herbert Howells (1892-1983)

Today is our organist's penultimate Sunday in his post at Dove of Peace. Over his last three weeks, he has been preparing some of his favorite music for our service voluntaries. Herbert Howells was a 20th-century English composer and organist, and a particular favorite of Dr. Seal. Howells' psalm preludes were conceived as free meditations on particular Psalm texts, rather than compositions based on preexisting musical material. His first psalm prelude reflects on Psalm 34, verse 6: "The poor man cried out, and the Lord heard him and saved him from all his troubles." This is a textbook example of Howells' "rhapsodic style," beginning with a quiet melody, moving through a number of shifting harmonies, then building to climatic crashing chords before becoming even quieter and more peaceful than the beginning. This is another great example of music that highlights Dove's organ, and the rich palette of tonal colors that the new instrument is able to achieve.


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



FIRST READING: Isaiah 35:4-7a

These verses are a word of hope to the exiles in Babylon. Isaiah 34 portrays God's vengeance on Edom, Israel's age-old enemy, which makes the path from Babylon to Zion safe for the exiles' return. The desert itself will flow with water to give drink to the returning exiles.

SECOND READING: James 2:1-17

Faithful Christians do not show partiality to the rich and powerful of the world, especially at the expense of the poor and weak. Likewise, faith does not pay mere lip service to God's will. Instead, a living Christian faith expresses itself in acts of compassion and mercy for those in need.

A reading from James.

¹My brothers and sisters, do you with your acts of favoritism really believe in our glorious Lord Jesus Christ? ²For if a person with gold rings and in fine clothes comes into your assembly, and if a poor person in dirty clothes also comes in, ³and if you take notice of the one wearing the fine clothes and say, "Have a seat here, please," while to the one who is poor you say, "Stand there," or, "Sit at my feet," ⁴have you not made distinctions among yourselves, and become judges with evil thoughts? ⁵Listen, my beloved brothers and sisters. Has not God chosen the poor in the world to be rich in faith and to be heirs of the kingdom that he has promised to those who love him? ⁶But you have dishonored the poor. Is it not the rich who oppress you? Is it not they who drag you into court? ¹Is it not they who blaspheme the excellent name that was invoked over you?

⁸You do well if you really fulfill the royal law according to the scripture, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." ⁹But if you show partiality, you commit sin and are convicted by the law as transgressors. ¹⁰For whoever keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become accountable for all of it. ¹¹For the one who said, "You shall not commit adultery," also said, "You shall not murder." Now if you do not commit adultery but if you murder, you have become a transgressor of the law. ¹²So speak and so act as those who are to be judged by the law of liberty. ¹³For judgment will be without mercy to anyone who has shown no mercy; mercy triumphs over judgment.

¹⁴What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? ¹⁵If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, ¹⁶and one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill," and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? ¹⁷So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead.





(The prayer petitions are frequently written or modified by the assisting minister, and vary between the first and second worship services.)


Each petition concludes, "Lord in your, mercy," and the assembly responds, "Hear our prayer."

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
*OFFERING PRAYER




*PREFACE (Sundays)

If you wish, you may join hands with members of your own household. Please do not join hands with others unless you have prior consent.


Gathered into one by the Holy Spirit, let us pray as Jesus taught us.

*INVITATION TO THE MEAL

The assembly sits. Worshipers who wish to receive communion may approach the altar (see guidelines below)

Option One: Communion by intinction (as before Covid)

Worshipers may stand or kneel at the altar rail, and then may lower their mask to receive communion. The bread wafer will be placed in your hand by the pastor. When the chalice is offered, you may dip the tip of the wafter into the wine, and then consume the wafer.

Option Two: Packaged wafer and wine

A sealed packet will be available at (or near) the baptismal font. After taking the packet and returning to your seat, you may open the top of the packet to remove the wafer and consume it. Then, turn the packet over, remove the seal over the wine, and sip the wine.

Improvisation

Improvisation has been an integral part of organ playing, particularly for worship, since the earliest days of the instrument. 
