WELCOME

Pastor Stephen Springer

Someone who isn't part of Jesus' own circle is casting out demons in Jesus' name, and the disciples want him stopped. They appeal to Jesus, as Joshua did to Moses about the elders who prophesied without official authorization. Like Moses, Jesus refuses to see this as a threat. Jesus welcomes good being done in his name, even when it is not under his control. The circle we form around Jesus' word must be able to value good being done in ways we wouldn't do it, by people we can't keep tabs on.

PROLOGUE

Pamela Decker, piano

Prelude and Fugue No. 12 in F minor, BWV 857 (Das Wohltemperierte Klavier) Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750)

Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) began work on the first book of The Well-Tempered Clavier (Das Wohltemporierte Klavier) in 1722, during his period of serving as musical director for Prince Leopold of Köthen. This collection is the first volume of two books, each including 24 "prelude and fugue" types of works in all available keys (revealing the possibilities inherent in the then-new tuning system of "equal temperament," which allowed the development and evolution of the functional tonality on which much of history's western tonal music is based). The Well-Tempered Clavier also serves as a collection of many styles, techniques, and genres of the Baroque period, such as various types of dances, aria-like references to vocal music, motets, concerti, and other references.

FIRST READING: Numbers 11:4-6, 10-16, 24-29

What constitutes legitimate need and legitimate leadership is the focus of this reading. God provides manna in the wilderness, yet the people crave meat. What is truly needful? God bestows the spirit on seventy elders, yet two men not designated as leaders prophesy in the power of God's spirit. What constitutes real leadership?

A reading from Numbers.

⁴The rabble among them had a strong craving; and the Israelites also wept again, and said, "If only we had meat to eat! ⁵We remember the fish we used to eat in Egypt for nothing, the cucumbers, the melons, the leeks, the onions, and the garlic; ⁶but now our strength is dried up, and there is nothing at all but this manna to look at."

¹⁰Moses heard the people weeping throughout their families, all at the entrances of their tents. Then the Lord became very angry, and Moses was displeased. ¹¹So Moses said to the Lord, "Why have you treated your servant so badly? Why have I not found favor in your sight, that you lay the burden of all this people on me? ¹²Did I conceive all this people? Did I give birth to them, that you should say to me, 'Carry them in your bosom, as a nurse carries a sucking child, to the land that you promised on oath to their ancestors'? ¹³Where am I to get meat to give to all this people? For they come weeping to me and say, 'Give us meat to eat!' ¹⁴I am not able to carry all this people alone, for they are too heavy for me. ¹⁵If this is the way you are going to treat me, put me to death at once—if I have found favor in your sight—and do not let me see my misery."

¹⁶So the Lord said to Moses, "Gather for me seventy of the elders of Israel, whom you know to be the elders of the people and officers over them; bring them to the tent of meeting, and have them take their place there with you."

²⁴So Moses went out and told the people the words of the Lord; and he gathered seventy elders of the people, and placed them all around the tent. ²⁵Then the Lord came down in the cloud and spoke to him, and took some of the spirit that was on him and put it on the seventy elders; and when the spirit rested upon them, they prophesied. But

they did not do so again.

²⁶Two men remained in the camp, one named Eldad, and the other named Medad, and the spirit rested on them; they were among those registered, but they had not gone out to the tent, and so they prophesied in the camp. ²⁷And a young man ran and told Moses, "Eldad and Medad are prophesying in the camp." ²⁸And Joshua son of Nun, the assistant of Moses, one of his chosen men, said, "My lord Moses, stop them!" ²⁹But Moses said to him, "Are you jealous for my sake? Would that all the Lord's people were prophets, and that the Lord would put his spirit on them!"

SECOND READING: James 5:13-20

Marks of the Christian community include praying for those who are sick and in need, celebrating with those in good health, restoring those who have strayed, confessing sins to one another, and offering forgiveness to each other.

A reading from James.

¹³Are any among you suffering? They should pray. Are any cheerful? They should sing songs of praise. ¹⁴Are any among you sick? They should call for the elders of the church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord. ¹⁵The prayer of faith will save the sick, and the Lord will raise them up; and anyone who has committed sins will be forgiven. ¹⁶Therefore confess your sins to one another, and pray for one another, so that you may be healed. The prayer of the righteous is powerful and effective. ¹⁷Elijah was a human being like us, and he prayed fervently that it might not rain, and for three years and six months it did not rain on the earth. ¹⁸Then he prayed again, and the heaven gave rain and the earth yielded its harvest.

¹⁹My brothers and sisters, if anyone among you wanders from the truth and is brought back by another, ²⁰you should know that whoever brings back a sinner from wandering will save the sinner's soul from death and will cover a multitude of sins.

³⁸John said to [Jesus,] "Teacher, we saw someone casting out demons in your name, and we tried to stop him, because he was not following us." ³⁹But Jesus said, "Do not stop him; for no one who does a deed of power in my name will be able soon afterward to speak evil of me. ⁴⁰Whoever is not against us is for us. ⁴¹For truly I tell you, whoever gives you a cup of water to drink because you bear the name of Christ will by no means lose the reward.

⁴²"If any of you put a stumbling block before one of these little ones who believe in me, it would be better for you if a great millstone were hung around your neck and you were thrown into the sea. ⁴³If your hand causes you to stumble, cut it off; it is better for you to enter life maimed than to have two hands and to go to hell, to the unquenchable fire. ⁴⁵And if your foot causes you to stumble, cut it off; it is better for you to enter life lame than to have two feet and to be thrown into hell. ⁴⁷And if your eye causes you to stumble, tear it out; it is better for you to enter the kingdom of God with one eye than to have two eyes and to be thrown into hell, ⁴⁸where their worm never dies, and the fire is never quenched.

***INVITATION TO THE MEAL**

"The gifts of God for the people of God." "Come; for all things are now ready." [Luke 14:17b, KJV] The assembly sits. Worshipers who wish to receive communion may approach the altar (see guidelines below)

Option One: Communion by intinction (as before Covid)

Worshipers may stand or kneel at the altar rail, and then may lower their mask to receive communion. The bread wafer will be placed in your hand by the pastor. When the chalice is offered, you may dip the tip of the wafer into the wine, and then consume the wafer.

Option Two: Packaged wafer and wine

A sealed packet will be available at (or near) the baptismal font. After taking the packet and returning to your seat, you may open the top of the packet to remove the wafer and consume it. Then, turn the packet over, remove the seal over the wine, and sip the wine. Meditation on "Veni Creator Spiritus" by Pamela Decker

Pamela Decker's Meditation on "Veni Creator Spiritus" was composed recently and intended to be a "fantasy" (in terms of musical form and procedure) on this well-known Gregorian chant melody that is connected with the liturgical time of Pentecost. References to the Holy Spirit in today's service make the piece on-target for this specific liturgical celebration. All composers develop individual musical languages through exposure to multitudes of influences from the past and present, with some being more prominently influential than others. The music of Pamela Decker has been influenced by the Baroque contrapuntists, as well as the language of the Swiss 20th-century composer Frank Martin, and the Spanish and South American composers Isaac Albeniz, Alberto Ginastera, and Astor Piazzolla (respectively).

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"Wer nur den lieben Gott lässt walten" Johann Ludwig Krebs (1713-1780)

Johann Ludwig Krebs (1713-1780) was a much-prized student of Johann Sebastian Bach (during Bach's time in Leipzig). Like Bach, he was also an organist. The majority of his works are for the "King of Instruments," a designation for the organ that was originated by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart. Bach's music made an enormous impression on Krebs, whose language remained rather Baroque in nature despite the "galant" stylistic direction that began to prevail not long after the death of Bach. Krebs was also active as a composer of vocal music and chamber music. The title of the work for the epilogue of today's service means "If You But Trust in God to Guide You." The text of this Lutheran chorale (on which this organ work is based) assures the listener that God's grace is accessible to those who trust in God.

As an organist, Pamela has concertized nationally and internationally, performing on many of the world's most significant organs. She is equally well known for her compositions for organ, many of which have been recorded in a five-volume series, "Decker Plays Decker," available on Spotify and other online platforms. Pamela and her compositions are also regularly featured on the public radio program "Pipe Dreams."

For decades, Dove of Peace Lutheran Church has been blessed with great church musicians. With Pamela joining our professional staff, we look forward to another season of blessing.
