PROLOGUE

Pamela Decker, pipe organ

On Jordan's Bank the Baptist's Cry Malcolm Archer (b. 1952)

Malcom Archer is a British composer/performer who is enjoying a career as a church and concert musician of the highest level. He studied at the Royal College of Music as an RCO scholar, and subsequently he was the organ scholar at Jesus College, Cambridge. He studied organ performance with Gillian Weir, Ralph Downes, and Nicholas Kynaston. Composition studies were with Herbert Sumsion and Alan Ridout, among others. During his developing career, he has served as organist and director of music at Wells Cathedral and St. Paul's Cathedral in London. From 2007-2018 he was on the faculty at Winchester College. He has composed vocal music and organ literature; the list of choral anthems is long and impressive. Among the publishers of his music are Oxford University Press and RSCM Publications. The organ work in the position of today's prologue is based on the tune titled "Winchester New" (which is often supplied with the text "On Jordan's Bank the Baptist's Cry). Today's gathering hymn on this same text is set to the tune "Puer nobis nascitur" ("Unto Us Is Born," which is more often supplied with Christmas texts). In the ELCA hymnal, the tune "Puer nobis nascitur" is employed at least three times for texts representing different liturgical seasons or topics. Thus, two different hymn tunes that both can carry the gathering hymn's text are given representation in today's service.

Blessed be the holy Trinity, + one God, who alone does wonders, who lifts up the lowly, who fills the hungry with good things. **Amen.**

FIRST READING: Zephaniah 3:14-20

The prophet Zephaniah's message is mostly one of judgment for sin. This reading, however, which comes from the conclusion of the book, prophesies joy for Judah and Jerusalem. Judgment has led to repentance, and God's salvation is at hand.

A reading from Zephaniah.

¹⁴Sing aloud, O daughter Zion; shout, O Israel! Rejoice and exult with all your heart, O daughter Jerusalem! ¹⁵The Lord has taken away the judgments against you, he has turned away your enemies. The king of Israel, the Lord, is in your midst; you shall fear disaster no more. ¹⁶On that day it shall be said to Jerusalem: Do not fear, O Zion; do not let your hands grow weak. ¹⁷The Lord, your God, is in your midst, a warrior who gives victory; he will rejoice over you with gladness, he will renew you in his love; he will exult over you with loud singing ¹⁸as on a day of festival. I will remove disaster from you, so that you will not bear reproach for it. ¹⁹I will deal with all your oppressors at that time. And I will save the lame and gather the outcast,

and I will change their shame into praise and renown in all the earth.
²⁰At that time I will bring you home, at the time when I gather you; for I will make you renowned and praised among all the peoples of the earth,
when I restore your fortunes before your eyes, says the Lord.

SECOND READING: Philippians 4:4-7

Despite being in prison, Paul is remarkably upbeat as he writes this letter. Here, he urges his friends in Philippi to trust God with all their worries and concerns with the hope that they will experience God's joy and peace.

A reading from Philippians.

⁴Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. ⁵Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. ⁶Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. ⁷And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

The word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.



*GOSPEL: Luke 3:7-18

John the Baptist heralds the mighty one who is coming. John teaches that preparation for God's reign is not a matter of identity but of bearing fruits of merciful justice, radical generosity, and vocational integrity.

The Holy Gospel According to Luke. Glory to you, O Lord.

⁷John said to the crowds that came out to be baptized by him, "You brood of vipers! Who warned *you to flee from the wrath to come?* ⁸Bear fruits worthy of repentance. Do not begin to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our ancestor'; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. ⁹Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire."

¹⁰And the crowds asked him, "What then should we do?" ¹¹In reply he said to them, "Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise." ¹²Even tax collectors came to be baptized, and they asked him, "Teacher, what should we do?" ¹³He said to them, "Collect no more than the amount prescribed for you." ¹⁴Soldiers also asked him, "And we, what should we do?" He said to them, "Do not extort money from anyone by threats or false accusation, and be satisfied with your wages."

¹⁵As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, ¹⁶John answered all of them by saying, "I baptize you with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. ¹⁷His winnowing fork is in his hand, to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

¹⁸So, with many other exhortations, he proclaimed the good news to the people.

On this Third Sunday of Advent, also known as Gaudate ("Rejoice") Sunday, Carolyn Jennings's adaptation of Isaiah 40 is especially fitting. Professor Emerita of Music at St. Olaf College, Jennings was also Music Coordinator and Director of the Senior Choir at St. John's Lutheran Church in Northfield, MN for more than 30 years. She composed and arranged more than 100 pieces, several of which were performed over the years at the famed annual St. Olaf Christmas Festival, including today's anthem.

Climb to the top of the highest mountain,

Joyous tidings proclaim to the world, Lift up your voice, shout the good news: Behold, your Lord comes to you.

He will feed his flock like a shepherd, He will carry the lambs in his arms, He will ever keep them safe from harm. Behold, your Lord comes to you.

He who made the stars in the heaven, He who fashioned the earth and the sea, From time eternal he was God, the Alpha and Omega, He. Behold your Lord! He will come in power and glory, He will rule with mercy and truth, Hope of all the nations, Light of all the world.

*INVITATION TO THE MEAL

"The gifts of God for the people of God." "Come; for all things are now ready." [Luke 14:17b, KJV] The assembly sits. Worshipers who wish to receive communion may approach the altar (see guidelines below)

Option One: Communion by intinction (as before Covid)

Worshipers may stand or kneel at the altar rail, and then may lower their mask to receive communion. The bread wafer will be placed in your hand by the pastor. When the chalice is offered, you may dip the tip of the wafer into the wine, and then consume the wafer.

Option Two: Packaged wafer

A sealed packet will be available at (or near) the baptismal font. It contains a host wafer which you may receive when you return to your seat.

MUSIC DURING COMMUNION

Meditation on "Conditor alme siderum" Alec Rowley (1892-1958)

Alec Rowley—an English composer, organist, pianist, lecturer, and scholar has contributed notably to twentieth-century organ literature. He studied at the Royal Academy of Music and won several prizes, such as the Mortimer Prize and the Prescott Prize, both in composition. Eventually he rose to the rank of professor at Trinity College of Music. He became a Fellow of the Royal Academy of Music (FRAM) in 1934. Along with his songs and choral compositions, he has written several concerto works. His organ treatment of the beautiful "Conditor alme siderum" chant (an Advent-oriented chant for which the opening text is "Creator of the Stars of Night) uses the melodic motives of the chant melody in beautifully realized sequences and patterns.

Rejoice, Rejoice, Believers Paul Manz (1919-2009)

Paul Manz, as recently described, established himself among the extremely prominent composers of sacred choral and organ music in the twentieth century. With training at Northwestern University and in Germany (under the direction of prominent figures such as Flor Peeters and Helmut Walcha), Paul Manz proceeded to serve as a renowned church and concert musician and to receive many honors in his field, including more than one honorary doctorate. Most recently he was Cantor Emeritus of Mount Olive Lutheran Church in Minneapolis and Professor Emeritus of Church Music at Christ Seminary at the Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago. His piece on the hymn tune "Haf trones lampa färdig" (Rejoice, Rejoice, Believers) displays the structural technique of employing a "ritornello" section that uses motives from the tune's melodic contour to create a recurring passage of an exuberant melodic and rhythmic character. This hymn (both tune and associated text) is in the position of the sending hymn in today's service. Thus, the last "tune" in the service is expressed first in singing and then as the basis of an organ solo.
