Within the gospel reading's profound words lies the simple message that God is revealed in a human person. Though we may try to understand how the Word existed with God from the beginning of time, the wonder we celebrate at Christmas is that the Word continues to dwell among us. Christ comes among us in the gathered assembly, the scriptures, the waters of new birth, and the bread and the wine. Through these ordinary gifts we receive the fullness of God's grace and truth.

PROLOGUE

Pamela Decker, pipe organ

Das neugeborene Kindlein David N. Johnson (1922-1987)

David N. Johnson was an American organist, composer, and music professor who produced over 300 published works, mostly in the category of liturgical music. He earned his Ph.D. at Syracuse University, and then taught for several years as part of the faculty at St. Olaf College in Northfield, MN, where he also was College Organist and later head of the music department. He then moved to Syracuse University, and finally Arizona State University. The work in the position of today's prologue is a partita on the indicated hymn tune (by Melchior Vulpius); the title means "the newborn little child." This partita has four distinct sections, with contrasting compositional techniques and registrations.



FIRST READING: Sirach 24:1-12

The figure of Wisdom played a major role in early discussions of Christology. Wisdom is the divine word, coming from the mouth of God, and ruling over all of creation. Wisdom, created at the beginning of time, made her dwelling place in Jerusalem among God's people.

A reading from Sirach.

Wisdom praises herself, and tells of her glory in the midst of her people.

²In the assembly of the Most High she opens her mouth, and in the presence of his hosts she tells of her glory:

³"I came forth from the mouth of the Most High, and covered the earth like a mist.

⁴I dwelt in the highest heavens, and my throne was in a pillar of cloud.

⁵Alone I compassed the vault of heaven and traversed the depths of the abyss.

⁶Over waves of the sea, over all the earth,

and over every people and nation I have held sway.

⁷Among all these I sought a resting place; in whose territory should I abide?

⁸"Then the Creator of all things gave me a command, and my Creator chose the place for my tent. He said, 'Make your dwelling in Jacob, and in Israel receive your inheritance.'

⁹Before the ages, in the beginning, he created me, and for all the ages I shall not cease to be. ¹⁰In the holy tent I ministered before him, and so I was established in Zion.

¹¹Thus in the beloved city he gave me a resting place, and in Jerusalem was my domain. ¹²I took root in an honored people, in the portion of the Lord, his heritage."

SECOND READING: Ephesians 1:3-14

In Jesus, all of God's plans and purposes have been made known as heaven and earth are united in Christ. Through Jesus, we have been chosen as God's children and have been promised eternal salvation.

A reading from Ephesians.

³Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places, ⁴just as he chose us in Christ before the foundation of the world to be holy and blameless before him in love. ⁵He destined us for adoption as his children through Jesus Christ, according to the good pleasure of his will, ⁶to the praise of his glorious grace that he freely bestowed on us in the Beloved. ⁷In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of his grace ⁸that he lavished on us. With all wisdom and insight ⁹he has made known to us the mystery of his will, according to his good pleasure that he set forth in Christ, ¹⁰as a plan for the fullness of time, to gather up all things in him, things in heaven and things on earth. ¹¹In Christ we have also obtained an inheritance, having been destined according to the purpose of him who accomplishes all things according to his counsel and will, ¹²so that we, who were the first to set our hope on Christ, might live for the praise of his glory. ¹³In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; ¹⁴this is the pledge of our inheritance toward redemption as God's own people, to the praise of his glory.

*GOSPEL: John 1:1-18

John begins his gospel with this prologue: a hymn to the Word through whom all things were created. This Word became flesh and brought grace and truth to the world.

The Holy Gospel According to John.

Glory to you, O Lord.

[In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

⁶There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. ⁷He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. ⁸He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. ⁹The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.]

¹⁰He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. ¹¹He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. ¹²But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, ¹³who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.


¹⁴And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. ¹⁵(John testified to him and cried out, "This was he of whom I said, 'He who comes after me ranks ahead of me because he was before me.'") ¹⁶From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. ¹⁷The law indeed was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. ¹⁸No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known.

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Break Forth, O Beauteous Heavenly Light (from Christmas Oratorio) I.S. Bach (1685-1750)


The Christmas Oratorio is comprised of six cantatas, each one designated for the major events of the Christmas period: Jesus's Birth, Annunciation to the Shepherds, Adoration of the Shepherds, Circumcision and Naming of Jesus, Journey of the Magi and Adoration of the Magi, otherwise known as Epiphany. This chorale, the most well-known from the oratorio, comes from the oratorio's second part and has been included in several hymnals.

in Jesus Christ our Savior.



We remember our new birth in his death and resurrection.


We look with hope for his coming.

All praise and glory are yours, Holy One of Israel, Word of God incarnate, Power of the Most High, one God, now and forever.




*THE LORD'S PRAYER

*INVITATION TO THE MEAL

The assembly sits. Worshipers who wish to receive communion may approach the altar (see guidelines below)

Option One: Communion by intinction (as before Covid)

Worshipers may stand or kneel at the altar rail, and then may lower their mask to receive communion. The bread wafer will be placed in your hand by the pastor. When the chalice is offered, you may dip the tip of the wafer into the wine, and then consume the wafer.

Option Two: Packaged wafer

A sealed packet will be available at (or near) the baptismal font. It contains a host wafer which you may receive when you return to your seat.

MUSIC DURING COMMUNION

The Angel Gabriel
Noel Rawsthorne (1929-2019)

The English organist/composer Noel Rawsthorne studied at the Royal Manchester College of Music. He was awarded a study grant that enabled him to work with Fernando Germani in Italy and with Marcel Dupre in Paris. He served as organist at Liverpool Cathedral and was Senior Lecturer in music at St. Katherine's College in Liverpool, which is now Liverpool Hope University. The piece during the communion today is a setting of the Basque melody associated with the indicated text about the angel Gabriel.



Antioch (Joy to the World) Pamela Decker (b. 1955)

Pamela Decker's composition based on the very familiar tune "Antioch" (the music we know as "Joy to the World") is the final piece in the published (Wayne Leupold Editions) suite entitled "On This Day, Earth Shall Ring." The set includes five hymn-based works for Advent and Christmas. The signature figuration in the setting is an energetic descending line in rapid I 6th-notes that evokes something of the effect of rapidly chiming carillon bells.
