
The feast of Epiphany ("manifestation") concludes the Christmas season with a celebration of God's glory revealed in the person of Jesus Christ. In Isaiah and Ephesians, that glory is proclaimed for all nations and people. Like the light of the star that guided the magi to Jesus, the light of Christ reveals who we are: children of God who are claimed and washed in the waters of baptism. We are sent out to be beacons of the light of Christ, sharing the good news of God's love to all people.

The German Baroque-period composer/organist Johann Gottfried Walther was an almost exact contemporary of his cousin J.S. Bach. Walther is known for having produced the first dictionary of music, the "Musikalisches Lexikon," which was impressively comprehensive and inclusive of information on musical terms and composers' biographical details. He was an accomplished and prolific composer of both liturgical and secular music.







FIRST READING: Isaiah 60:1-6

Jerusalem is assured that nations will make a pilgrimage to her because the light of God's presence is in her midst. The bountiful food of the sea and the profits of international trade will come streaming to Jerusalem and thereby declare God's praise.

A reading from Isaiah.

¹Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you. ²For darkness shall cover the earth. and thick darkness the peoples; but the Lord will arise upon you, and his glory will appear over you. ³Nations shall come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn. ⁴Lift up your eyes and look around; they all gather together, they come to you; your sons shall come from far away, and your daughters shall be carried on their nurses' arms. ⁵Then you shall see and be radiant; your heart shall thrill and rejoice, because the abundance of the sea shall be brought to you, the wealth of the nations shall come to you. ⁶A multitude of camels shall cover you, the young camels of Midian and Ephah; all those from Sheba shall come.

They shall bring gold and frankincense, and shall proclaim the praise of the Lord.

SECOND READING: Ephesians 3:1-12

What had been hidden from previous generations is now made known through the gospel ministry of Paul and others. In Christ both Jews and Gentiles participate in the richness of God's promised salvation.

A reading from Ephesians.


¹This is the reason that I Paul am a prisoner for Christ Jesus for the sake of you Gentiles—²for surely you have already heard of the commission of God's grace that was given me for you, ³and how the mystery was made known to me by revelation, as I wrote above in a few words, ⁴a reading of which will enable you to perceive my understanding of the mystery of Christ. ⁵In former generations this mystery was not made known to humankind, as it has now been revealed to his holy apostles and prophets by the Spirit: ⁶that is, the Gentiles have become fellow heirs, members of the same body, and sharers in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel.

⁷Of this gospel I have become a servant according to the gift of God's grace that was given me by the working of his power. ⁸Although I am the very least of all the saints, this grace was given to me to bring to the Gentiles the news of the boundless riches of Christ, ⁹and to make everyone see what is the plan of the mystery hidden for ages in God who created all things; ¹⁰so that through the church the wisdom of God in its rich variety might now be made known to the rulers and authorities in the heavenly places. ¹¹This was in accordance with the eternal purpose that he has carried out in Christ Jesus our Lord, ¹²in whom we have access to God in boldness and confidence through faith in him.

*GOSPEL: Matthew 2:1-12

God's promise shines bright in the night as magi follow a star to honor a new king. Strangers from a faraway land, they welcome the long-awaited messiah of Israel.

The Holy Gospel According to Matthew. Glory to you, O Lord.

¹In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, ²asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." ³When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; ⁴and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. ⁵They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:

"And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah,

are by no means least among the rulers of Judah;

for from you shall come a ruler

who is to shepherd my people Israel."

⁷Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. ⁸Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." ⁹When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. ¹⁰When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. ¹¹On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. ¹²And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

To the Christ Child Regina Holmen Fryxell (1899-1993)

Juilliard-trained organist Regina Holmen Fryxell taught music for many years at Augustana College in Rock Island, Illinois, where she earned her undergraduate degrees in music and English. As a composer, she wrote numerous anthems, including today's piece for unison choir in chant-like style. Notably, she contributed to the church's hymnal Service Book and Hymnal (1958) by setting several of the liturgical texts. O wondrous Child!



By the leading of a star he was shown forth to all nations;


in the waters of the Jordan you proclaimed him your beloved Son;

All praise and glory are yours, Holy One of Israel, Word of God incarnate, Power of the Most High, one God, now and forever.




*THE LORD'S PRAYER

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***INVITATION TO THE MEAL**

"The gifts of God for the people of God." "Come; for all things are now ready." [Luke 14:17b, KJV] The assembly sits. Worshipers who wish to receive communion may approach the altar (see guidelines below)

Option One: Communion by intinction (as before Covid)

Worshipers may stand or kneel at the altar rail, and then may lower their mask to receive communion. The bread wafer will be placed in your hand by the pastor. When the chalice is offered, you may dip the tip of the wafer into the wine, and then consume the wafer.

Option Two: Packaged wafer

A sealed packet will be available at (or near) the baptismal font. It contains a host wafer which you may receive when you return to your seat.

MUSIC DURING COMMUNION

Es ist das Heil uns kommen her (Salvation Now Is Come to Earth) Sigfrid Karg-Elert

Sigfrid Karg-Elert was a late-Romantic (and/or somewhat transitional post-Romantic) German composer who wrote extensively for the organ. His music displays Baroque-influenced counterpoint perfumed with liberal sprays of chromaticism, kaleidoscopic key modulations, and lush harmonic progressions. He served as a professor of music theory and composition at the Leipzig Conservatory and appeared frequently as a performer.

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Es ist das Heil uns kommen her (Salvation Now Is Come to Earth) Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750)

Johann Sebastian Bach is recognized as the most prominent and magnificent of all Baroque-period composers. His influence as a contrapuntist and a musical poet extends through all of Western music history and into the compositional techniques and languages of living composers of our time who have been trained in European-influenced programs. He served as a court composer for German noblemen, and as a church musician for many years at the St. Thomas Church in Leipzig. He was also known as a highly accomplished organist. During his lifetime, Bach had two wives (consecutively, not concurrently) and fathered a total of 20 children, of whom 10 survived into adulthood. Four of his sons eventually became composers.



Worship and the Spread of Covid

The highly transmissible Omicron variant of Covid-19 is now spreading rapidly in Southern Arizona. Our congregation council believes that we should not hold public indoor worship service if the rate of transmission reaches or exceeds 100 daily cases per 100,000 population. (This is a very standard measurement tool in communities everywhere.)



As of January 5, Pima County had a rate of 73 cases per 100,000, and the number continues to rise rapidly.

For comparison:

Pima County	73
Maricopa County	102
Arizona statewide	101
Los Angeles, CA	224
Miami, FL	525
Chicago, IL	207
Las Vegas, NV	125
Santa Fe, NM	106
El Paso, TX	68
Denver, CO	192

Because the data fluctuates significantly on a daily basis, we rely on an average taken over a period of seven to fourteen days.

With Omicron, case numbers tend to double on a weekly basis.

It is reasonable to expect the numbers to rise drastically in Tucson in the next few days and weeks, and to plan accordingly.

Our congregation council has developed a comprehensive set of guidelines for staff and worship leaders, and for other matters. You can see the entire set on our website: doveofpeaceutcson.org/covid

If the average daily case statistic rises above 100 per 100,000 in Pima County:

- We will close the 9:30 a.m. worship service to all but those who are involved in producing the video service for live stream and later viewing.
- We will encourage worshipers to take advantage of our outdoor service or our online worship, which will continue at 11:00 a.m.
- We will re-open for indoor public worship once the statistic drops below 100 again.

If you discover that you have contracted Covid, and if you have been to worship recently, please contact our pastor, so he can determine who else might have been exposed and make appropriate notifications.
