PROLOGUE

Finale (Andante) from Sonata No. 6 Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847)

Felix Mendelssohn composed six large-scale, multi-movement sonatas for organ. The piece in the position of the prologue today is the final movement of the last of the sonatas. This work is based on the chorale titled "Vater unser im Himmelreich" ("Our Father Who Art in Heaven"), which is a musical evocation of the Lord's Prayer, for which the much-loved tune "Vater unser," dates from 1539. Mendelssohn was a great friend and advocate in the matter of the music of Johann Sebastian Bach, and he did much to spark a revival of Bach performances and attention directed toward Bach's significance in the history of Western music.

*PRAYER OF THE DAY

Let us pray.

O Lord God, you teach us that without love, our actions gain nothing. Pour into our hearts your most excellent gift of love, that, made alive by your Spirit, we may know goodness and peace, through your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

FIRST READING: Acts 11:1-18

In defense of his earlier baptism of non-Jewish believers, Peter demonstrates to the members of the Jerusalem church that God's intention to love Gentiles as well as Jews is revealed in Jesus' testimony. In this way the mission to the Gentiles is officially authorized.

A reading from Acts.

¹Now the apostles and the believers who were in Judea heard that the Gentiles had also accepted the word of God. ²So when Peter went up to Jerusalem, the circumcised believers criticized him, ³saying, "Why did you go to uncircumcised men and eat with them?" ⁴Then Peter began to explain it to them, step by step, saying, ⁵"I was in the city of Joppa praying, and in a trance I saw a vision. There was something like a large sheet coming down from heaven, being lowered by its four corners; and it came close to me. ⁶As I looked at it closely I saw four-footed animals, beasts of prey, reptiles, and birds of the air. ⁷I also heard a voice saying to me, 'Get up, Peter; kill and eat.' ⁸But I replied, 'By no means, Lord; for nothing profane or unclean has ever entered my mouth.' ⁹But a second time the voice answered from heaven, 'What God has made clean, you must not call profane.' ¹⁰This happened three times; then everything was pulled up again to heaven. ¹¹At that very moment three men, sent to me from Caesarea, arrived at the house where we were. ¹²The Spirit told me to go with them and not to make a distinction between them and us. These six brothers also accompanied me, and we entered the man's house. ¹³He told us how he had seen the angel standing in his house and saying, 'Send to Joppa and bring Simon, who is called Peter; ¹⁴he will give you a message by which you and your entire household will be saved.' ¹⁵And as I began to speak, the Holy Spirit fell upon them just as it had upon us at the beginning. ¹⁶And I remembered the word of the Lord, how he had said, 'John baptized with water, but you

will be baptized with the Holy Spirit.' ¹⁷If then God gave them the same gift that he gave us when we believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I that I could hinder God?'' ¹⁸When they heard this, they were silenced. And they praised God, saying, "Then God has given even to the Gentiles the repentance that leads to life.''

SECOND READING: Revelation 21:1-6

John's vision shows us that in the resurrection the new age has dawned; God dwells with us already. Yet we wait for the time when the tears that cloud our vision will be wiped away. Then we will see the new heaven, new earth, and new Jerusalem.

¹I saw a new heaven and a new earth; for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and the sea was no more. ²And I saw the holy city, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. ³And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying,

"See, the home of God is among mortals.

He will dwell with them;

they will be his peoples,

and God himself will be with them;

⁴he will wipe every tear from their eyes.

Death will be no more;

mourning and crying and pain will be no more,

for the first things have passed away."

⁵And the one who was seated on the throne said, "See, I am making all things new." Also he said, "Write this, for these words are trustworthy and true." ⁶Then he said to

Mendelssohn is widely known for his epic oratorio about Elijah, but his first work in the genre that brought him much acclaim was that about Paul's conversion and mission. Originally written in German, it was later translated to English for performances in England. St. Paul is in two parts, and today's anthem comes near the end of the second part before Paul's martyrdom. The libretto for the text is mostly taken from the Acts of the Apostles, as well as other parts of the Bible. In today's Gospel, Jesus gives his commandment to all disciples to love one another; today's anthem with words from John declares that God first loved us that we might be called his children.

> See, what love hath the Father bestow'd on us in his goodness, that we should be called God's own children! *I John 3:1*

Prayer Seven

Holy God, holy and mighty, holy and immortal: you we praise and glorify, you we worship and adore.

You formed the earth from chaos; you encircled the globe with air; you created fire for warmth and light; you nourish the lands with water. You molded us in your image, and with mercy higher than the mountains, with grace deeper than the seas,

you blessed the Israelites and cherished them as your own.

That also we, estranged and dying, might be adopted to live in your Spirit, you called to us through the life and death of Jesus.

In the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying: This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.

*LAMB OF GOD

Worshipers may stand or kneel at the altar rail, and then may lower their mask to receive communion. The bread wafer will be placed in your hand by the pastor. When the chalice is offered, you may dip the tip of the wafer into the wine, and then consume the wafer.

Come Down, O Love Divine Mark Sedio (b. 1954)

Mark Sedio is Cantor at Central Lutheran Church in Minneapolis, where he serves as organist, choirmaster, resident composer, and educator. He also is on the faculty of Luther Seminary in St. Paul. He has a master's degree in choral conducting and literature from the University of Iowa. He has won many awards and commissions as a composer, and his works are published by several prominent publishing houses. The melody of his work at the communion position is the same as that for the hymn of the day this morning ("Down ampney" being the tune's name).

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Gott sei gelobet und gebenedeiet Heinrich Scheidemann (1595-1663)

Heinrich Scheidemann was arguably the most celebrated German organist and composer of the early to mid-17th century, and he was a significant forerunner of Dieterich Buxtehude and J. S. Bach. He studied with another luminary of the field: the Dutch organist/composer Jan Pietersoon Sweelinck. Scheidemann traveled to Amsterdam to work with this renowned master. Scheidemann later served as organist at the Catharinenkirche (the Church of St. Catherine). He passed away in 1663 in Hamburg, Germany, during an outbreak of the plague. The work in the position of epilogue today is on a German chorale tune titled "Gott sei gelobet und gebenedeiet," which is wellcoordinated with the tune of the sending hymn ("Gelobt sei Gott"), both of which have the meaning of "Praised be God," but the two melodies are different. They are both praise hymns, though, and this is on target for today's worship.
