WELCOME AND INTRODUCTION TO THE DAY

PROLOGUE

Pamela Decker, pipe organ

Herr Jesu Christ, dich zu uns wend' Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750)

The music for today's prologue is a chorale prelude from the renowned volume titled Orgelbüchlein (The Liturgical Year) by Johann Sebastian Bach. The collection includes forty-five preludes based on chorale melodies grounded in German Lutheran hymnody. The title of this chorale preludes is translated as "Lord Jesus Christ, Be Present Now." Scholars have surmised that Bach composed these works during his period of time in Cöthen, partially because the pedal parts of the works match the pedalboard compass of the organ that he played during his years of work in Cöthen. There also has been speculation that he composed the pieces while serving time in prison for his stubborn insistence on being released from the service of the Duke of Weimar. Bach's goal was to write pieces that would meet the needs of the church year; initially there were sketches for 161 works for the set. The piece that is today's prologue is based on the melody of the gathering hymn.





FIRST READING: HABAKKUK 1:1-4; 2:1-4

Injustice and violence in the time leading up to the Babylonian exile move this prophet to lament: How can a good and all-powerful God see evil in the world and seemingly remain indifferent? God answers by proclaiming that the righteous will live by faith.

¹The oracle that the prophet Habakkuk saw.

²O Lord, how long shall I cry for help, and you will not listen? Or cry to you "Violence!" and you will not save? ³Why do you make me see wrongdoing and look at trouble? Destruction and violence are before me: strife and contention arise. ⁴So the law becomes slack and justice never prevails. The wicked surround the righteous therefore judgment comes forth perverted. ^{2:1}I will stand at my watchpost, and station myself on the rampart; I will keep watch to see what he will say to me, and what he will answer concerning my complaint. ²Then the Lord answered me and said: Write the vision; make it plain on tablets, so that a runner may read it. ³For there is still a vision for the appointed time; it speaks of the end, and does not lie. If it seems to tarry, wait for it; it will surely come, it will not delay. ⁴Look at the proud! Their spirit is not right in them, but the righteous live by their faith.

This letter written to Timothy is a personal message of encouragement. In the face of hardship and persecution, Timothy is reminded that his faith is a gift of God. He is encouraged to exercise that faith with the help of the Holy Spirit.

¹Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, for the sake of the promise of life that is in Christ Jesus,


²To Timothy, my beloved child:

Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord.

³I am grateful to God—whom I worship with a clear conscience, as my ancestors did—when I remember you constantly in my prayers night and day. ⁴Recalling your tears, I long to see you so that I may be filled with joy. ⁵I am reminded of your sincere faith, a faith that lived first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice and now, I am sure, lives in you. ⁶For this reason I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you through the laying on of my hands; ⁷for God did not give us a spirit of cowardice, but rather a spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline.

⁸Do not be ashamed, then, of the testimony about our Lord or of me his prisoner, but join with me in suffering for the gospel, relying on the power of God, ⁹who saved us and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works but according to his own purpose and grace. This grace was given to us in Christ Jesus before the ages began, ¹⁰but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Savior Christ Jesus, who abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel. ¹¹For this gospel I was appointed a herald and an apostle and a teacher, ¹²and for this reason I suffer as I do. But I am not ashamed, for I know the one in whom I have put my trust, and I am sure that he is able to guard until that day what I have entrusted to him. ¹³Hold to the standard of sound teaching that you have heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. ¹⁴Guard the good treasure entrusted to you, with the help of the Holy Spirit living in us.

The Word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.** The acclamation "Alleluia" is sung before and after the cantor sings the verse of the day.

*GOSPEL: Luke 17:5-10

On the way to Jerusalem, Jesus instructs his followers about the power of faith and the duties of discipleship. He calls his disciples to adopt the attitude of servants whose actions are responses to their identity rather than works seeking reward.

The Holy Gospel According to Luke. **Glory to you, O Lord**.

⁵The apostles said to the Lord, "Increase our faith!" ⁶The Lord replied, "If you had faith the size of a mustard seed, you could say to this mulberry tree, 'Be uprooted and planted in the sea,' and it would obey you.

⁷"Who among you would say to your slave who has just come in from plowing or tending sheep in the field, 'Come here at once and take your place at the table'? ⁸Would you not rather say to him, 'Prepare supper for me, put on your apron and serve me while I eat and drink; later you may eat and drink'? ⁹Do you thank the slave for doing what was commanded? ¹⁰So you also, when you have done all that you were ordered to do, say, 'We are worthless slaves; we have done only what we ought to have done!' "


O Lord, Increase My Faith Henry Loosemore (1607-1670)

In today's Gospel, the disciples ask Jesus to increase their faith, and the words of today's anthem amplify our prayer for more faith yet today. Long attributed to Orlando Gibbons, the piece was written by the lesser known Baroque composer Henry Loosemore. Son of an organ builder, Loosemore was organist at King's College, Cambridge from 1627 until his death. While his compositional output was not prodigious, today's anthem is a fine example of the indelible imitative style characteristic of the Renaissance.



Prayer One

You are indeed holy, almighty and merciful God. You are most holy, and great is the majesty of your glory.

In the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me. Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying: This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.

For as often as we eat of this bread and drink from this cup, we proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.



Remembering, therefore, his salutary command,

Passacaglia Johann Kaspar Ferdinand Fischer (c. 1656-1746)

Johann Kaspar Ferdinand Fischer was a German (probably Bohemian) composer who served as Kapellmeister for Ludwig Wilhelm of Baden. The German musicologist and theorist Johann Nikolaus Forkel-one of the founders of the field of musicology-considered Fischer to be among the top composers of keyboard music of his time. Many of his compositions work well for either harpsichord or organ, and I am sure that Fischer would agree that they are just as effective as piano pieces. This Passacaglia is a beautifully developed work in the genre; a passacaglia is a piece in 3/4 meter that features a series of variations on a recurring bass (or basso ostinato). The form arose in 17thcentury Spain and was taken up in many other countries and periods; it began as an interlude between accompanied songs and/or dances.

Cornet Voluntary Henry Heron (1738-1795)

Henry Heron was an English composer and dance instructor who served as organist at the Church of St. Magnus the Martyr, next to London Bridge. He taught music and dance, following in large part in the footsteps of his father, who was a dance master. Henry Heron was known for using his services to support children's charities of the time. He and his wife had five children, of whom one son became a composer and was to serve as his successor in the school for music and dance that Heron established in Newington Butts, in Lambeth. The work in the position of epilogue today is a vigorous voluntary that makes use of mutation stops (meaning those that emphasize harmonics above the selected tone) in addition to the foundation registers of the organ.
