WELCOME AND INTRODUCTION TO THE DAY

June 25: Presentation of the Augsburg Confession, 1530

On this day in 1530 the German and Latin editions of the Augsburg Confession were presented to Emperor Charles of the Holy Roman Empire. The Augsburg Confession was written by Philipp Melanchthon and endorsed by Martin Luther and consists of a brief summary of points in which the reformers saw their teaching as either agreeing with or differing from that of the Roman Catholic Church of the time. In 1580 when the Book of Concord was drawn up, the unaltered Augsburg Confession was included as the principal Lutheran confession.

Carl Philipp Emmanuel Bach (1714-1788)

Carl Philipp Emanuel Bach was the second surviving son of Johann Sebastian Bach and his first wife, Maria Barbara Bach. C. P. E. Bach was one of four sons of J. S. Bach who became professional musicians. His body of works includes orchestral, choral, and instrumental compositions; he was held in high esteem during his lifetime. C. P. E. Bach was also one of the more accomplished keyboard performers of his time. The set of six sonatas from which this movement is taken was composed for Princess Amalia, sister of Frederick the Great of Prussia. C. P. E. Bach's compositional style joined influences from his father with characteristics of the developing galant style of the Classic period.

SECOND READING: Romans 6:1b-11

In baptism we were incorporated into the reality of Christ's death and resurrection. We have been made new in Christ through his death and resurrection to live freed from sin.

A reading from Romans.

^{1b}Should we continue in sin in order that grace may abound? ²By no means! How can we who died to sin go on living in it? ³Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? ⁴Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life.

⁵For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. ⁶We know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body of sin might be destroyed, and we might no longer be enslaved to sin. ⁷For whoever has died is freed from sin. ⁸But if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. ⁹We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. ¹⁰The death he died, he died to sin, once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. ¹¹So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

*GOSPEL: Matthew 10:24-39

Jesus warns his disciples that their ministry in his name will meet with opposition. However, he assures them that they need not fear for the truth will come to light. Life is found in Christ.

³²"Everyone therefore who acknowledges me before others, I also will acknowledge before my Father in heaven; ³³but whoever denies me before others, I also will deny before my Father in heaven.

³⁴"Do not think that I have come to bring peace to the earth; I have not come to

bring peace, but a sword.

³⁵For I have come to set a man against his father, and a daughter against her mother, and a daughter-in-law against her mother-in-law;

³⁶and one's foes will be members of one's own household.



Pamela Decker (b. 1955)


Golden Gates was commissioned by the American Guild of Organists for the Region IX Convention in 2011 in San Francisco, during which it received its world premiere performance by the concert organist Angela Kraft Cross, who is an organist, composer, and ophthalmological surgeon. The piece is, in part, a tribute to the city of San Francisco and its international mixture of cultures and arts. The work juxtaposes thematic and harmonic materials influenced by Chinese musical materials (but of my own design) with Hispanic and South American dance rhythms applied to a second theme that is clothed in transformations based on flamenco modal patterns. One of the primary themes in the work is loosely based on a transformed version of the hymn "Enviado soy de Dios" (ELW 538).




Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying:

To you, O God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory in your holy church, now and forever.




*THE LORD'S PRAYER

Johann Gottfried Walther, a contemporary and a cousin of J. S. Bach, was a German composer, organist, music theorist, and lexicographer of the Baroque period. He composed 132 preludes based on German Lutheran chorale melodies, along with free works that are not based on chants or chorale tunes. He transcribed concerto works by other composers for performance as organ solo pieces. The communion piece for today's services is based on the melody of the hymn of the day.





Postlude in D minor, Op. 105 (VI) Charles Villiers Stanford (1852-1924)

Charles Villiers Stanford was born in Dublin, Ireland, and later studied at the University of Cambridge; he also traveled to Leipzig and Berlin for subsequent studies that prepared him thoroughly for his work as a leading British composer of his time. He composed orchestral music, chamber works, operas, choral literature, and organ works. He also was active as a conductor. He served as a professor of composition and as conductor of the college orchestra at the Royal College of Music. In addition, he held a professorship at the University of Cambridge. He was influenced by Brahms and other Romantic period composers; he was conservative by comparison with many contemporaries from other parts of Europe. However, he had a distinctive and individual compositional style that always was endowed with both sound construction and innate musicality.

An Alert about Protesters and Disruptors

Congregations in Tucson have been told by our ecumenical and interfaith partners in Phoenix that protesters have been entering houses of worship on the sabbath and disrupting worship services.

If such a thing were to happen at Dove of Peace:

- Authorities and those with experience in these matters tell us that YOU SHOULD
 NOT ENGAGE with the protesters. They may call you names or use slurs. Do not
 become angry and do not argue with them. That is what they are seeking.
- If the protesters are standing on the roadside, then they are not on church-owned property, and they have the legal right to protest. (This has happened in the past on very rare occasions.)
- If the protesters come onto church property, they should be told to leave. "You are not allowed to be here. Please leave the premises now." Repeat if necessary.
- Call law enforcement using 911. When first talking to the dispatcher, tell them our location and that there are unwanted people on the property. Let the dispatcher know immediately if any of the following things are taking place:
 - (I) If the intruders are causing physical harm or damage to anyone;
 - (2) If the intruders are armed;
 - (3) If the intruders are refusing to leave after being asked.
 - Be prepared to give the dispatcher a clear description of the intruders: what they are wearing; whether they are short or tall; whether they have a beard, mustache or are clean shaven; what kind of vehicle they are driving if you are able to safely see it.
- **ONLY IF IT IS SAFE**, use your phone to take photos or video of the trespassers. Again, do not communicate with them other than to tell them to leave the property.
