WELCOME AND INTRODUCTION TO THE DAY

Jesus' parable about two sons who don't do what they say reveals surprises in the reign of God. In the reading from Ezekiel the people claim the ways of the Lord are unfair, while God offers repentance and new life. Paul urges us to look to Christ as a model of humility, putting the interests of others above our own. Nourished by the broken bread and shared cup, we offer our lives for the sake of our needy world.

Partita on "Was frag' ich nach der Welt" Flor Peeters (1903-1986)

Flor Peeters was a Belgian organist, composer, and teacher who held the position of organist at Mechelen Cathedral for 63 years (1923-1986). He also served as director of the Conservatorium in Antwerp, Belgium. Peeters was an active concert organist and recording with a career that was international in scope. His training included an emphasis on Renaissance polyphony; he coupled this with 20th-century influences such as polytonality and complex polyrhythms in developing his style as a composer. His work based on the German chorale tune "Was frag ich nach der Welt" is constructed as a partita, wherein a series of variations on the tune appear as successive segments in the overall structure of the piece. This tune is the melody for today's hymn of the day.

FIRST READING: EZEKIEL 18:1-4, 25-32

Ezekiel challenges those who think they cannot change because of what their parents were and did, or who think they cannot reverse their own previous behavior. God insistently invites people to turn and live.

A reading from Ezekiel.

¹The word of the Lord came to me: ²What do you mean by repeating this proverb concerning the land of Israel, "The parents have eaten sour grapes, and the children's teeth are set on edge"? ³As I live, says the Lord God, this proverb shall no more be used by you in Israel. ⁴Know that all lives are mine; the life of the parent as well as the life of the child is mine: it is only the person who sins that shall die.

²⁵Yet you say, "The way of the Lord is unfair." Hear now, O house of Israel: Is my way unfair? Is it not your ways that are unfair? ²⁶When the righteous turn away from their righteousness and commit iniquity, they shall die for it; for the iniquity that they have committed they shall die. ²⁷Again, when the wicked turn away from the wickedness they have committed and do what is lawful and right, they shall save their life. ²⁸Because they considered and turned away from all the transgressions that they had committed, they shall surely live; they shall not die. ²⁹Yet the house of Israel says, "The way of the Lord is unfair." O house of Israel, are my ways unfair? Is it not your ways that are unfair?

³⁰Therefore I will judge you, O house of Israel, all of you according to your ways, says the Lord God. Repent and turn from all your transgressions; otherwise iniquity will be your ruin. ³¹Cast away from you all the transgressions that you have committed against me, and get yourselves a new heart and a new spirit! Why will you die, O house of Israel? ³²For I have no pleasure in the death of anyone, says the Lord God. Turn, then, and live.

SECOND READING: Philippians 2:1-13

As part of a call for harmony rather than self-seeking, Paul uses a very early Christian hymn that extols the selflessness of Christ in his obedient death on the cross. Christ's selfless perspective is to be the essential perspective we share as the foundation for Christian accord.

A reading from Philippians.

¹If then there is any encouragement in Christ, any consolation from love, any sharing in the Spirit, any compassion and sympathy, ²make my joy complete: be of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind. ³Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. ⁴Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others. ⁵Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus,

⁶who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited,
 ⁷but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness.
 And being found in human form,
 ⁸he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross.

Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name,
 so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth,
 and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

¹²Therefore, my beloved, just as you have always obeyed me, not only in my presence, but much more now in my absence, work out your own salvation with fear and trembling; ¹³for it is God who is at work in you, enabling you both to will and to work for his good pleasure.



*GOSPEL: Matthew 21:23-32

After driving the moneychangers out of the temple (21:12), Jesus begins teaching there. His authority is questioned by the religious leaders, who are supposed to be in charge of the temple.

The Holy Gospel according to Matthew.

Glory to you, O Lord.

²³When [Jesus] entered the temple, the chief priests and the elders of the people came to him as he was teaching, and said, "By what authority are you doing these things, and who gave you this authority?" ²⁴Jesus said to them, "I will also ask you one question; if you tell me the answer, then I will also tell you by what authority I do these things. ²⁵Did the baptism of John come from heaven, or was it of human origin?" And they argued

with one another, "If we say, 'From heaven,' he will say to us, 'Why then did you not believe him?' ²⁶But if we say, 'Of human origin,' we are afraid of the crowd; for all regard John as a prophet." ²⁷So they answered Jesus, "We do not know." And he said to them, "Neither will I tell you by what authority I am doing these things.

²⁸"What do you think? A man had two sons; he went to the first and said, 'Son, go and work in the vineyard today.' ²⁹He answered, 'I will not'; but later he changed his mind and went. ³⁰The father went to the second and said the same; and he answered, 'I go, sir'; but he did not go. ³¹Which of the two did the will of his father?" They said, "The first." Jesus said to them, "Truly I tell you, the tax collectors and the prostitutes are going into the kingdom of God ahead of you. ³²For John came to you in the way of righteousness and you did not believe him, but the tax collectors and the prostitutes believed him; and even after you saw it, you did not change your minds and believe him."

Above All Praise and All Majesty, Op.79, No.3 Felix Mendelssohn-Bartholdy (1809-1847)

One of the greatest composers of the nineteenth century, Felix Mendelssohn-Bartholdy was an accomplished composer and conductor, who was influenced greatly by the music of Bach. In fact, Mendelssohn is credited with the world-wide revival of interest in Bach's music after it had fallen out of favor.

Mendelssohn composed for nearly every genre and is especially well-known for his symphonies and large-scale choral works, several of which utilize Lutheran chorales, like many of Bach's works. Mendelssohn also wrote numerous shorter sacred works (motets), including today's anthem. Originally written in German and intended for the feast of the Ascension, the piece proclaims Jesus's majesty and demands our praise, a theme found in today's second lesson.

Above all praise and all majesty, Lord, thou reignest evermore. Hallelujah.





To you, O God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory in your holy church, now and forever.




*THE LORD'S PRAYER

Meditation on "King's Weston" Pamela Decker (b. 1955)

This meditation on the tune titled "King's Weston" presents the melody in interaction with a contrasting countermelody. The contrasting contours of each melody develop both separately and in superimposition. The melody was composed by the British composer Ralph Vaughan Williams; it is a tune that evokes the harmonic language of a D-transposed Aeolian mode. "King's Weston" is the tune for today's sending hymn.

Fugue in A minor John Stanley (1712-1786)

John Stanley was an English organist, violinist, and composer who has the distinction of having been the youngest person (at 17) to complete a Bachelor of Music degree at the University of Oxford. For 52 years he served as organist at the Society of the Inner Temple (the ancient Temple Church), where his music-making was heard by many renowned colleagues, including George Frideric Handel. He composer music in several genres, including choral works and organ literature. For the king's wedding in 1762, Stanley composed an oratorio titled Arcadia. In 1779 he assumed the position of Master of the King's Band. His music is still frequently performed in both concert and liturgical settings.
